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#### INTRODUCTION.

This volume is a third and final instalment, covering surnames P to Y, of the Cheshire Inquisitions post mortem during "the Stuart Period." The first portion, covering surnames A to D, with an Introduction to which readers are referred, formed volume 84, and the second portion, covering surnames E to O, formed volume 86, of the Society's publications.

#### PETER PAVER.

(Chester 3. File 89. No. 23.)

INQUISITION taken at Northwich, 9 September, 9 James I [1611] before Henry Mainwaring esq., escheator in co. Chester, by virtue of the King's writ to enquire after the death of Peter Paver by the oath of Richard Gerrard of Crewewood, George Rutter of Kingesley, James Trevys of Horton, John Eaton of Sandiwaie, Ralph Bostocke of Moulton, Peter Hall of Norley, David Hinton of Rushton, Thomas Deane of Church Hulme, James Trevett of Sproston, John Ravenscroft of Occleston, Roger Neild of Shurlache, John Blease of Shipbrooke & Randall Wrenche of Moulton, gentlemen.

They say that long before his death, the said Peter Paver was seised in fee of a mess. in Stanthorne & Bostocke in the tenure of William Farrington & Hugh Farrington, his son; of a saltworks of 4 leads (in English one wychehouse of foure leades wallinge) in Northwich in the tenure of Robert Aynsworth; of a mess., a horse mill in Northwich, in the tenure of Helen Paver, widow, late wife of said Peter.

So being seised, an indenture was made 10 May, 7 James I [1609] between the said Peter Paver of one part & Dorothy Leycester, widow of Adam Leycester esq., & Margaret Shakerley, late the daughter of Peter Shakerley esq., deceased, of the other, whereby on payment of £77 10s. od. the said Peter Paver demised the said premises to the said Dorothy & Margaret for 21 years, at a peppercorn rent, with condition that on payment of £137 10s. od. to the said Dorothy & Margaret within the next 5 years the same demise to be void.

They say the premises in Stanthorne & Bostocke are held of the Prince as Earl of Chester by knight service & are worth yearly (clear) 30s.

The saltworks, mess. & horse mill in Northwych are held of William, Earl of Derby, as of his manor of Northwich in burgage & by suit of court & worth yearly (clear) 53s. 4d.

The said Peter Paver died at Northwich, 21 January, 7 James I [1609–10] & Roger Paver is his son & next heir & was aged 15 years on 2 October last past.

The said Dorothy Leycester & Margaret Shakerley have taken the issues of the lands demised to them since Peter's death & William & Hugh Farrington those in Bostock.

### JAMES PERCEVALL OF LYMM, GENT. (File 98. No. 9.)

Inquisition taken at Nether Knottesford, 18 October, 21 James I [1623] before Hugh Maynwaringe esq., escheator in co. Chester, & Peter Daniell esq., feodary there, by virtue of the Prince's writ to enquire after the death of James Percevall, late of Lymme, gent., by the oath of William Leigh of Owtrington, William Morris of Groppenhall, William Millington of Stretton, Peter Picton of Grange, Henry Porter of Moore, John Hatton of Latchford, John Lankshawe of the same, Richard Steele

of Reddish, Thomas Shawe of Millington, Philip Antrobus of Peever, Alexander Duncalfe of Mobberley, Randall Blackshaw of the same, Randall Wright of Ashley, Ralph Barlow of Hale, Hugh Ashton of Bowdon, Alexander Vawdrey of the same, Thomas Perrin of Hale & George Massie of the same, gentlemen.

They say the said James Percevall was seised in fee of 3 mess., 3 gardens, 40 a. of land, 20 a. of meadow, 20 a. of pasture, 6 a. of wood in Lymme, Lymboothes & Owtrington, late parcel of the lands, &c., of John Boydell, gent.

The said premises are held of Peter Warburton of Arley, esq., by 20th part of a knight's fee & yearly rent of 2d. & are worth yearly (clear) 40s.

The said James Percevall died at Islington, co. Middlesex, 2 April last past & James Percevall is his son & heir & on 21 September last past was aged 17 years.

Thomas Maddocke; of £4 16s. 2d. rent of fee farm issuing yearly from certain tenements in Over, in the several tenures of Thomas Mainwaring gent., Thomas Maisterson esq., Henry Lee esq., Ralph Walley of Stanthorne, gent., Robert Manwaring, gent., John Kinsey, Andrew Burton, Arthur Blacamore, Edward Roby, Thomas Baker, Ralph Maddocke, Robert Whitingham, Abraham Darlington, Nicholas Wilcockson, John Wilcockson, William Alexander, John Bosyer, Thomas Throppe, Thomas Maddocke, Richard Maddocke, Robert Totly, Henry Codell, John Darlington & Thomas Barker of Gale; & of the court leet & view of frankpledge in Over.

The said manor & premises are held of the King as of his county of Cheshire in chief by half a knight's fee & worth yearly (clear) 20 marks.

The said Edmund Peshall died in the city of London, 26 March, 4 Charles I [1628-9] & Edmund Peshall gent. is his son & heir & at his father's death was aged 22 years & more.

Thomas Peshall & Christopher Ayres, executors of the will of the said Edmund & John Pepys & John Wallinger, his creditors, the said Edmund Peshall the son, Thomas Cholmondeley esq., Henry Lee esq., & Ralph Bostocke have taken the issues & profits of the premises since the death of the said Edmund.

### THOMAS PESHALL ESQ. (File 96. No. 5.)

Inquisition taken at Nantwich, 21 September, 19 James I [1621] before Hugh Maynwaringe esq., escheator in co. Chester, & Peter Danyell esq., feodary there, by virtue of the Prince's commission to enquire after the death of Thomas Peshall esq., by the oath of Edward Bressie of Audlem, William Dod of Highfields, John Cheswis of Mickley, Robert Alsager of Alsager, Thomas

Knight & Robert Poole of the same, Lawrence Cotton of Bircher, Thomas Adams of Hatherton, Robert Meakin of the same, John Scot of Checkley, Thomas Smith of the same, John Gallimore of Betchton, William Gallimore of the same, John Furnivall of the same, John Wright of Willaston & Richard Kettle of Betchton, gentlemen.

They say that the said Thomas Peshall, long before his death, was seised of the moiety of the manor of Wistaston & of the moiety of the advowson of Wistaston Church, of the capital mess, or farm called Checkley Hall in Checkley; of 6 cottages, 7 gardens, 7 orchards, 100 a. of land, 20 a. of meadow, 100 a. of pasture, 100 a. of wood, 20 a. of moor, 20 a. of moss in Checkley, belonging to the said capital mess.; of a mess., a garden, an orchard, 20 a. of land, 4 a. of meadow, 20 a. of pasture with common of pasture & turbary belonging to the said mess. in Stapleford, in the tenure of Thomas Partington gent.; of a mess., a garden, an orchard, 2 a. of land, 2 a. of meadow, 3 a. of pasture & common to the same mess. belonging in Cotton Edmunds, in the tenure of Ralph Finchett: of a mess., a garden, an orchard, in Malpas, in the tenure of John Heyne; of a mess., a garden, an orchard, 2 a. of land, 2 a. of meadow in Malpas, called Deppenbach, in the tenure of Henry Brow; of a mess., a garden, an orchard, 10 a. of land, 1 a. of meadow, 10 a. of pasture & common of pasture & turbary to the said mess., belonging in Hauton, called Bobberhill, in the tenure of Randall Stokes, & of a saltworks in Droitwich, in the tenure of John Lewis.

The said moiety of Wistaston manor, & the advowson there are held of the heirs of Bressie [sic] by fealty only & worth yearly (clear) 53s. 4d.

Checkley Hall & the premises in Checkley held of Sir Thomas Delves kt. & bart., as of his manor of Blakenhall, by fealty & rent of Id. a year & worth yearly (clear) 40s.

The premises in Stapleford held of John Bruyn esq., as of his manor of Bruyn Stapleford by fealty & rent of Id. a year or a pair of gloves, worth yearly (clear) 10s.

The premises in Cotton Edmunds held of Peter Venables

esq., by fealty only & worth yearly (clear) 5s.

Deppenbach in Malpas & the other premises there held of the said Sir William in like manner & worth yearly (clear) 2s.

Those in Hauton held of Sir Rowland Egerton kt. & bart., & at Thomas Peshall's death held of Sir John, father of Rowland, as of his manor of Hauton, by fealty only & worth yearly (clear) 2s. 6d.

The saltworks in Droitwich held of the said Sir William Brereton, as of his manor of Malpas, by fealty only &

worth yearly (clear) 2s.

The said Thomas Peshall died at Horsley, co. Staff., 23 November, 7 James I [1609] & Sir John Peshall bart. is his son & next heir & at the time of his father's death was aged 30 years & more.

#### JOHN PICKERING YEO.

(File 88. No. 9.)

Inquisition taken at Budworth in the Water, 24 April, 5 James I [1607] before Henry Maynwaringe esq., escheator in co. Chester, by virtue of the King's writ to enquire after the death of John Pickeryn yeoman, by the oath of James Roe of Acton, Julius Wynington of Byrches, Edward Mouldsworth of Wymyncham, William Malbone of Budworth, John Allen of Nether Whitley, John Crosbie of Over Whitley, Thomas Hall of Budworth, Robert Pickmere of Hulse, Richard Wright of Ashley, Thomas Harper of High Leighe, William Foxley of Pickmeyre, Gilbert Middleton of Stockton, Henry Heskyth

of Rye Croft, Thomas Anderton of Budworth, & John Langeshawe of Latchford, gentlemen.

They say that the said John Pickeryn the day he died, was seised in fee, of a mess., 6 a. of land, I a. of meadow & 8 a. of pasture, with common of pasture in Great Budworth.

The said premises are held of the King in chief by 30th part of a knight's fee & are worth yearly (clear) IIs.

So being seised, the said John Pickerin made his will at Budworth 24 February, 1602[-3], bequeathing a moiety of his lands, &c., to his wife Joan, for life, with remainder after her death & of the residue to his son, William & the heirs of his body, in default of such issue, to testator's daughter, Katherine Pickerin & her issue.

The said John Pickerin died 15 March, 1602[-3] & William Pickerin is his son & next heir & is aged 28 years & more.

Joan Pickerin, widow of the said John, survives & dwells at Budworth & has taken the issues, &c., of the moiety of the said premises since her husband's death; the said William Pickerin, in October, 1603, at Middlewich married [name of wife not given].

Chester, Ralph Wilbraham esq., feodary there, John Minshall, & Thomas Trafford esq., by virtue of the King's commission to enquire after the death of John Poole of Poole, esq., by the oath of Edward Swettenham of Somerford, esq., Richard Steele of Sandbach, John Rode of Walhill, Humphrey Page of Yeardshawe, Hugh Venables of Wimbo . . ., John Ravenscroft of Eccleston, Ralph Bostock of Moulton, Oliver Vernon of Middlewich,

Hugh Furnivall of Bechton, Richard Kettle & Richard Shawe of the same, William Salmon of Wyldheath & Randall Smith of Brinley, gentlemen.

They say that long before his death the said John Poole was seised in fee of the manors of Buerton, Poole alias Nether Poole, Capenhurst & Stanlowe alias Stanlowe Grange & of . . . 2 watermills, a windmill, 2000 a. of land, 500 a. of meadow, 2000 a. of pasture, 600 a. of marsh, 1000 a. of furze & heath & 10s. rent in Buerton, Poole alias Nether Poole, Capenhurst, Stanlowe alias Stanlowe Grange, Great Neston, Liscard, Kirkeby, Wallesey, Thingwall, Leighton, & Chester city.

He was also seised in fee of mess. in Nether Bebbington in the several tenures of John Bretter, William Hogson, Roger Irby, John Platt & John Janyon & of the lands, &c., thereunto belonging, & of 2 mess. in Great Neston in the several tenures of Richard Madock & John Sharpe & of the lands, &c., thereunto belonging; & of 2 mess. in Wallezey in the tenures of Elizabeth Hill & Ellen Gill; & of a mess. in Backford late in the tenure of Richard Lacy.

So being seised, by his deed of 24 January, 3 [sic] [? 30] Elizabeth, on account of a marriage had between his son & heir apparent, John Poole esq. & Mary, then his wife, daughter of Sir Roland Stanley kt., he conveyed the said premises to Sir Lawrence Smith kt., William Moston, Robert Fulleshurst esqrs., & William Stanley esq., to the use of the said Mary & her husband, John Poole & their male issue, with remainders as declared in the marriage settlement & a fine was levied at Chester, 15 April, 30 [sic] Elizabeth [1588] settling the same as abovesaid, with remainders to the heirs male of the body of John Poole sen. & his right heirs, as by indenture made 10 January, 29 Eliz. [1586–7] between Sir Roland Stanley & John Poole sen.

They say he was also seised, with remainder to his said son, of 4 mess, in Buerton in the several tenures of Richard Pickfocks, John Sevill, Thomas Dikes & Robert Hill & all thereunto belonging & of a parcel of land in Buerton called Buerton Park, late in the tenure of John Sevill: & a parcel of meadow in Buerton called the Parke Poole, in the tenure of Richard Browade, a mess, in Woodhowse Lane in Buerton & all thereunto belonging in the tenure of William Gamull; a close of pasture in Buerton called the High Bridge Hill, a croft there called Calvercroft, late in the tenure of Thomas Gamull. deceased; the new park in Buerton in the tenure of the said John Poole esq., & of Collman's Meadow, Trotone More, Ashemore with meadow adjoining, the Great Stockings, the Little Stockings, Stockings, the Syde Field, with meadow adjoining, the Convgree, the High Bridge Hill, the Wall Meadow, the Wall Croft, Pigge Croft, & 2 other crofts, in Buerton, late in the tenure of Thomas Gamull, also of 3 mess, in Buerton in the several tenures of John Gamull gent., Roger Tewe & Thomas Whittingham & of a parcel of common land called Accalfes in Buerton & his said son, John, stands seised of the remainder.

By indenture of 28 March, 39 Eliz. [1597] made between John Poole of Poole, gent., son & heir apparent of John Poole aforesaid, esq., & John Morgell & Richard Frogge of Chester, gents., the tenement in Woodhouse Lane, lordship of Buerton & all thereunto belonging & the closes called Highbridge Hill, Calver Close, the New Park of Buerton, Calman's Meadow, Twelve More, Ashe More & meadow, Great & Little Stockings, the Stockings, Syde Field & meadow, the Mastocke, Conynges, Wall Meadow, Wall Croft, Pigs Croft & two other crofts in Buerton & the tenements in the occupation of Richard Pickstockes of Buerton & John Sevill of Buerton & Thomas Dykes & Robert Hill of Buerton, were conveyed

to the said Morgell & Frogge, in trust for Elianor Poole, natural daughter of the said John Poole the younger, she paying the old rent, & for his sons John, George, Francis & Edward Poole; the grant to said Elianor to be void on payment of 1000 marks, that is, 200 marks a year for 5 years after the death of John Poole the elder & Katherine his wife, & a fine was levied to this effect 4 April following.

The said Elianor married John Bowes esq. & they sold the said premises to Thomas Gamull esq. for £40 & he died seised thereof.

By indenture of 20 February, 41 Eliz. [1598–9] made between John Poole the son, described as of Capenhurst, gent., & Edmund Gamull of Chester, alderman, the mess. within Buerton Manor in the tenure of Richard Pickstocks & that in the tenure of Robert Hill, lands called Roughe Ground, Buerton Park, Park Pool & all thereunto belonging in Buerton were sold to the said Edmund Gamull for £383.

By indenture of 28 September, 41 Elizabeth [1599] made between the said John Poole the younger, by the name of John Poole of Capenhurst, esq., & Thomas Bunbury of Stanney, esq., & Edward Dutton of Chester, gent., the manors & lands, &c., in Poole, Stanlowe, Capenhurst, Great & Little Neston, Buerton, Hurlston, Ashfield, Backford, Bebbington, Wallezy, Thingwall, Handbridge, Oscroft, Moreton, Leighton & Frodsham were conveyed to the said Bunbury & Dutton to the uses of a fine, which fine was levied 1 October, 41 Eliz. [1599].

By indenture of 2 June, 43 Eliz. [1601] between the said John Poole of Capenhurst & Thomas Gamull of Inner Temple, London, gent., he mortgaged to said Gamull, for £190, 3 mess. in Buerton.

An indenture was made 25 Sept., 43 Eliz. [1601] between John Poole, now living, son & heir of John Poole,

late of Capenhurst, deceased, & the said Thomas Gamull, agreeing that whereas certain premises were conveyed to Elianor Bowes, sister of said John, which he had power to redeem, the said redemption shall be made over to the said Gamull.

They say that John Poole, the son, was seised in fee of a close called the Wallisey & closes called the Warled Hay & the Roughhey in Capenhurst & by fine levied 20 April, 43 Eliz. [1601] conveyed the same to William Brooke esq., to hold during the lives of the said John Poole & Mary, his wife; John died & Mary survives him & dwells at Oldfeld.

They say that John Poole, late the son & heir apparent of the said John Poole sen., died long before his father & that John Poole sen., the father, died 5 December last past.

They say the said manor of Buerton & the premises there are held of the heirs of Richard Corbett esq., in socage, by rent of a rose yearly & are worth yearly (clear) £33 9s. IId.

The manor of Poole alias Nether Poole held of Jasper Worth esq., in socage, by fealty & yearly rent of 1d. & worth yearly (clear) 20 marks.

The manor of Capenhurst & premises there held of the King, as of his barony of Halton, by 20th part of a knight's fee & worth yearly (clear) 5 marks.

The manor of Stanlowe *alias* Stanlowe Grange & premises there held of the King in chief by knight service & worth yearly (clear) 40s.

The premises in Great Neston held of William Whitmore esq., in socage & by rent of 12d. yearly & worth yearly (clear) 26s. 8d.

Those in Liscard & Kirkeby Wallesey held of the heirs of Thomas Meoles in socage, by fealty & rent of a red rose yearly & worth yearly 20s.

Those in Thingewall held of the heirs of Sir Thomas

Fulleshurst kt. in socage, by fealty only & worth yearly (clear) 10s.

Those in Leighton held of William Whitmore esq., in socage & by fealty & rent of a rose & worth yearly (clear) 5s.

Those in Chester city, tenure unknown, worth yearly (clear) 20s.

John Poole esq. is next of kin to the said John Poole esq., being son & heir of John Poole, gent., deceased, & Mary, his wife, the said John Poole, gent., having been son & heir apparent of said John Poole esq., & is now aged 30 years & more.

### JOHN POVALL OF LONDON. (File 105. No. 17.)

Inquisition taken at Nantwich, I September, 18 Charles I [1642] before Thomas Aldersey esq., escheator in co. Chester, by virtue of the King's writ to enquire after the death of John Povall of London, by the oath of Thomas Chester of Coolelane, Thomas Scott of Checkley, Randall Grafton of Worleston, John Waste of Hunsterson, Thomas Bromhall of Springlane, William Jackson of Little Acton, John Smith of Checkley, Randall Smith of Underwood, John Barnett of Hill, Thomas Shoare of Nantwich, William Wilbraham of Brindley, Hugh Ankers of Wichehaugh & John Harobin of Nantwich, gentlemen.

They say on oath that John Povall, long before his death, was seised in fee of a mess. in Eaton, called Rowlinson's Tenement in the tenure of Phillip Wilson; of a cottage in Eaton in the tenure of Ralph Brooke; of a mess. there in that of Ralph Minshall; of a cottage there in that of Robert Jeynson & another cottage there in that of John Jeynson; & of a half part of a cottage in Rushton in that of John Freer & of all his part of a mess. there in that of William White & Richard Cane; of 20 a. of land, 6 a. of meadow, 10 a. of pasture, 5 a. of

wood & 30 a. of heath & moor belonging to the said cottages; of the 6th part of the manors of Rishton, Eaton and Torpurley & all lands, courts, privileges, customs, &c., thereunto belonging.

Chester & Flint, & by his Letters Patent bearing date of July, 28 Henry VIII [1536] demised to Edmund Peckham esq., his cofferer, the said manors as appears by the exemplification of 16 July, 16 James I [1618] now shown to the jurors [here recited], which said premises had been granted to William Brereton esq., now deceased, & had come into the King's hands by reason of the said William's attainder; afterwards Edmund Peckham by indenture bearing date 22 January, 28 Henry VIII [1536-7] granted the same to Robert Tatton, late of Withenshaw, esq., at a yearly rental of £144, & by indenture of 4 March, 36 Henry VIII [1544-5] confirmed the same for 29 years. By his indenture of I May, 3 & 4 Philip & Mary [1557] Robert Tatton assigned all his interest in the same to Sir Edmund Peckham kt., & George Peckham esq., who, by their indenture of 3 May, 3 & 4 Philip & Mary [1557] granted the same to said Robert Tatton for 80 years, II months. 3 weeks. & the said Robert Tatton entered into the same.

So being seised, Sir Edmund Peckham, by his deed of 13 May, 3 & 4 Philip & Mary [1557] released all his title in the said manors to George Peckham esq., his son, after the termination of the lease to the said Robert Tatton.

By indenture of 20 May, 3 & 4 Philip & Mary [1557] Robert Tatton aforesaid released to Robert Royle & Reginald Paulden all his title in the manor of Echells, co. Chester & lands, &c., in Owerton Maddocke & Worthinbury, co. Flint, parcel of the manor of Aldford, co. Chester.

By Letters Patent of 29 May, 3 & 4 Philip & Mary [1557] the reversion of the said manors was granted to Sir Edward

Fitton kt. of Gawsforth & the said Robert Tatton of Withenshaw esq., on payment of £2600, at a yearly rental of £100, with all thereunto belonging, as before granted to Edmund Peckham kt., as more fully appears by the said Letters Patent [here quoted].

So being seised, the said Edward Fitton & Robert Tatton on 30 May, 3 & 4 Philip & Mary [1557] made partition of the said manors, by virtue whereof the said Robert Tatton was solely seised by the reversion of the manor of Echells.

They say that the said Robert Tatton, father of the said William, was seised in fee of the manors of Withenshawe & Northen alias Northerden & of 280 mess., 2 water grain-mills, 2 dovecotes, 200 gardens, 1080 a. of land, 1000 a. of meadow, 1700 a. of pasture, 300 a. of wood, 100 a. of furze & heath, 100 a. of moor, 100 a. of turbary, 200 a. of land covered with water & £6 rent in Withenshaw, Northen alias Northerden, Echells, Tymperley, Baguley & Altringham & of free fishery in the Mersey.

So being seised, the said Robert Tatton, the elder, on 2 November, 10 Elizabeth [1568] by indenture conveyed the manors of Echells & Northerden & all his lands in cos. Chester & Flint to William Booth of Dunham Massye, esq. & William Massye of Puddington, esq. to the use of himself, for life, with contingent remainders to his son & heir apparent, William Tatton, in tail male, to his other sons, Robert, Edward & Nicholas Tatton, in tail male, to his right heirs.

The said Robert, the father, died 18 June, 21 Elizabeth [1576] at Withenshaw, after whose death the manors of Withenshaw, Northen alias Northerden, Timperley, Altrincham, Baguley & the reversion of the manor of Echells descended to the said William Tatton, as son & heir of the said Robert.

So being seised, the said William, by indenture bearing date 22 October, 23 Elizabeth [1581], on the marriage

of his son & heir apparent, Robert Tatton, with Eleanor, daughter of John Warren esq., which marriage was afterwards solemnised, conveyed the reversion of the said manors &c., after his death, in consideration of Eleanor's dower of 1000 marks, to the said Robert & Eleanor & the heirs male of their bodies. And whereas by letters patent of 24 November, 38 Henry VIII [1546] the parsonage of the parish church of Bowdon, with all houses, glebe lands, &c., late possession of the late monastery of Birkenhead, were demised to Arthur Belfeld & Robert Tatton for 40 years, at a yearly rental of £50 & by other conveyances came to the said William Tatton for on years, the said William now conveyed them to Sir Piers Leigh kt., Richard Mollynax of Sefton, co. Lancs., esq. & Edward Warren, son & heir apparent of the said John Warren, on condition that he, the said William & Dorothy Tatton, widow, will make an indenture with the said John Warren of Poynton, esq., assuring the moiety of the said parsonage of Bowdon, to himself for life, with contingent remainders to the said Robert Tatton & his heirs male by the said Eleanor, to the uses of the said William's will, the said William to support the said Robert & Eleanor, & such children as they may have, at his own charge, with servant to attend Eleanor according to her degree, as long as Dorothy Tatton, mother of said William, shall live & after Dorothy's death, to pay the said Eleanor f 50 a year for life.

The jurors say a fine was levied at Chester, 4 October, 44 Elizabeth [1602] between Sir Peter Leighe & Sir George Leicester kts. & the said William Tatton, of the manors of Withenshawe, & Northen alias Northenden & reversion of the manor of Ecchells & the lands &c., there & in Tymperley, Altrincham & Begulley & the park of Peele, & of all the before recited lands, &c., & a free fishery in the Mersey, to the uses of an indenture made 12 October, 44 Elizabeth [1602] whereby the same were settled on the

said William Tatton, for life, with remainder to his grandson, William Tatton, in tail male, with contingent remainders to Robert Tatton, brother of the said William, party to these presents, in tail male, to his youngest brother, Nicholas Tatton, for life, to John Tatton *alias* Manley, reputed son of said William, in tail male, to the right heirs of said William for ever.

By indenture of I March, 45 Elizabeth [1602-3] made between the said William Tatton of Wythenshaw, esq. & Sir George Leicester of Toft, kt., a marriage between William, the grandchild & Katherine Leicester, one of the daughters of Sir George, having already been had, a mess. in Northenden in the tenure of Nicholas Shalcrosse of the yearly rent of 3s. 8d., a mess. there & mess. there in the tenure of Ralph Tomlinson, of the yearly rent of 16d.; of Victor Sindrells, yearly rent 3s. 10d.; of Ellis Kempe, vearly rent 12s. 6d.; of John Hamnett, yearly rent 6s. 8d.; of William Goodier, yearly rent 15s.; of James Deane, yearly rent 7s. 8d.; of John Holte & Joan, his mother, yearly rent 7s. 8d.; of Margery Ridgeway, widow, yearly rent 6s. 8d.; of Ellen Sindrells, widow, yearly rent 2s.; of Arnold Hunt, yearly rent 10s. 8d.; of William Hunt. yearly rent 2s. 10d.; of Hugh Berrye, yearly rent 4s.; of Richard Burges & Katherine, his mother, yearly rent 6s. 8d.; of James Barlowe & Dorothy Barrett, yearly rent 22s.; of Jeffrey Shelmerdine, yearly rent 6s. 8d.; of Nicholas Whearnebye, yearly rent 3s.; of Christopher Bronhill, yearly rent 6s. 8d.; of Richard Brounehill, yearly rent 12d.; of Humphrey Shelmerdyne & John Shelmerdyne, yearly rent 20s. 8d.; of William Tomlinson, yearly rent 19s. 10d.; of James Shelmerdyne & John Hankinson, yearly rent 20s.; of Henry Roylle, yearly rent qs. 4d.; of Robert Coppock, yearly rent 31s. 2d.; of Edward Baylye, yearly rent 13s.; of John Houlte & Joan, his mother, yearly rent 2s.; of said William Tomlinson, yearly rent 12d.; of said Ellen Sindrell,

yearly rent 12d. & all closes in the manor of Echells, belonging to the capital mess. called the Peele, in Echells, called Baylie ground, Wyghurst, Combes Wood, the Four Brendearths, Gatley Wood, Slutchte ground, Roughwood, the Pleames, the Two Acre, Shawcrosse Meadow, Brome Crofts, the Crunbrockes, amounting to the clear yearly value of 100 marks, were settled on the said William, the grandchild, & Katherine, his wife, & their male issue, with contingent remainders to the male issue of the said William, the grandchild, the male issue of William the grandfather, in tail male, to Robert, Edward & Nicholas Tatton, brothers of William, the grandfather, in tail male, to John Tatton alias Manley, reputed son of William, the grandfather, in tail male, to the right heirs of said William for ever, & as to the residue to the use of the said William, for life with contingent remainders to his grandchild, William, &c. [as before].

An indenture was made 6 November, 2 James I [1604] between the said William Tatton, Sir Peter Leigh of Lyme, kt., & Sir George Leycester of Toft, kt., for the better assurance & conveyance of the premises, as in the aforesaid fine.

By indenture of 5 February, 2 James I [1604–5] the said William enfeoffed James Massey, George Parker & Henry Coxson of the said manors of Wythenshawe, Northen alias Northenden & Echells & all lands, &c. in Whithenshawe, Northen, Echells, Gatley, Painswicke, Charston, Kenardley alias Kenworth, Moreside, Timperley, Altrincham, Bodon, Dunham Massey, Woodhouses, Sale & Hale & the free fishery in the water of the Mersey, to the uses of an indenture made I March, 45 Elizabeth [1582–3].

So being seised, the said William Tatton esq. died 19 May, 9 James I [1611] at Withenshawe, after whose death William Tatton gent., the younger, entered into the said manors & lands & is thereof seised as by law required.

So being seised. William Tatton, the younger, by indenture bearing date 14 January, 9 James I [1611-12] together with Robert Tatton of Withenshawe, esq., covenanted with Sir George Both of Dunham, kt. & bart., William Breareton of Ashley, esq., James Kessall of Bradshaw in Chedle & William Warren of Lostocke in Povnton, gents., that they would convey the aforesaid manors, the capital mess, called Withenshawe Hall & the Peele of Echells in Withenshawe, Northen & Echells & all lands, &c., thereunto appertaining except the mess. & lands in the tenure of Maud, widow of Robert Goodier, deceased, closes late in the tenure of Raynold Royle, deceased, called Crossefields alias Withenshawe Park. & of all other their lands, &c., in Gatley, Pownsacke, Sharston, Kinerley alias Kinworthy. Altringham, Timberley & Moreside & would levy a fine at the next assizes at Chester, settling eight parcels of land called Bayly Ground, three parcels called Wighurst & other lands called Combes Wood, Gulley Wood, Stutcht Ground, Rough Wood, the Pleanes, the Two Acres, Shawe Croft Meadow, the Broune Croft, Crimbecks, all in the manor of Etchells & belonging to the said capital mess, called the Peele of Etchells, on the said William Tatton & Katherine now his wife, for the term of their lives, with contingent remainders, after their deaths, to Robert Tatton gent., son & heir apparent of the said William, in tail male, to the other sons of the said William. in tail male, to Robert Tatton gent., 2nd son of Robert, the father, in tail male, to Philip Tatton, 3rd son of Robert, the father, in tail male, to the other sons of the said Robert Tatton, the father, in tail male, to Edward Tatton of Etchells, gent., uncle of Robert Tatton, the father, in tail male, to Nicholas Tatton of Etchells, gent., another uncle of the said Robert the father, in tail male, to the right heirs of the said Robert, the father, for ever; & as to mess in Northen in the tenures of Nicholas

Shawcrosse, Ralph Tomlinson, Victor Sindrells, Ellen Kempe, & others (already named) to the use of the said Robert Tatton, the father, for life, with contingent remainders to the said William & Katherine Tatton. in tail male, &c. [as before]: & as to the Peele of Echells & lands, &c., thereunto appertaining, in the occupation of the said William Tatton & Henry Cockeson, to the use of the said William for life, & as to the manors of Withenshawe, Etchells & Northen alias Northerden to the use of Robert Tatton, the father, he paying the said William \$23 11s. od. a year, during his life, & after his death to the use of the said William Tatton, &c. [as before], & it was to be lawful for the said Robert Tatton by his indenture or last will to dispose of Lower Peele Park & lands in Withenshaw & Northen to his now wife Susan or any other wife or to the wife of the son & heir apparent of the said William, as jointure, & to make a yearly rent charge of £6 13s. 4d. for each of his younger sons & a marriage portion for his daughters.

The said Robert, the father, demised to John Carrington certain lands & the said William Tatton junior acquiesced therein & also permitted his father to occupy the lands, &c., named in the last indenture & to take the

profits thereof.

By indenture of 14 December, 14 James I [1616] William Tatton aforesaid mortgaged to Thomas Goodyer, citizen & draper of London, the capital mess. called Withenshaw Hall, in Withenshaw & Northen & all thereunto belonging, including the Hall Field, the Longe Eye, the Emottes Eye, the Sweyne Park, the Calver Croft, the Higher Saxfield, the Ryle alias Royle Thorne & Hollow Meadow, the Ryle alias Royle Orchard, & Streetfield, the Fullshawes, the Hall Meadow, the Horse Coppice, the Lawton Eye, the Wheat Eye, the Black Croppes, the Five Day Mathe, the Cowfalls, redeemable on payment of £556 on 20 May 1618.

A fine was levied at Chester, 17 April, 13 James I [1615] of an indenture made 12 April, 13 James I between William Tatton of Peele, gent. & Peter Warburton of Lincoln's Inn, esq. & Robert Hyde, son & heir apparent of Hamnett Hyde of Northburie, esq., whereby the said William Tatton demised to said Warburton & Hide closes called the Sprinke, Great Plain & Punrose Hill in Etchells & the Slutched Grounds there for 80 years at a peppercorn rent.

By indenture made the last day of February, 15 James I [1617–18] between John Welde of London, esq. & John Mayle of London, the elder, esq. & Thomas Sharman & William Richbell, citizens of London, a yearly rent of £45 6s. 8d. out of the manors of Aldeford Echells & Alderleigh was granted to the said Sharman & Richbell [the grant to Edmund Peckham esq., &c. being recited] for a certain term of years.

They say the manor of Echells & lands there & in Timperley & the free fishery in the Mersey were held of the King in chief by a fortieth part of a knight's fee & worth yearly (clear) 15 li.

The manors of Withenshawe & Northerden, except 10 a. called the Chauntry Lands held of the Dean & Chapter of Chester Cathedral by fealty only, held in free & common socage & worth yearly (clear) 40s. & the said 10 a. formerly chantry lands held of the King, as of his manor of East Greenwich, co. Kent, in free & common socage only & not in chief & worth yearly (clear) 4s.

The lands in Altringham held of Sir George Bouth kt. & bart., as of his manor of Dunham Massey in socage, by fealty only & worth yearly (clear) 40s.

The said William Tatton died, seised of the aforesaid manors & lands, 19 May, 9 James I [1611], at Withenshawe & Robert Tatton is his son & heir & is now aged 40 years & more.

They say that William Tatton, the younger, late son & heir apparent of the said Robert, had taken all the profits &c. from the time of the death of the said William Tatton esq. named in the commission until the death of the said William Tatton gent., the younger, except the issues of the premises received by the said Robert Tatton, as before specified; which said William Tatton, the younger, died & January, 14 James I [1616–17]. Katherine Tatton, widow of William Tatton, the younger, from the time of the death of the said William Tatton the younger, has taken the issues of the said manors & lands until the day of the taking of this inquisition.

[This is followed by two other inquisitions, held on William Tatton gent., on the same day, with the same jurors & ending thus:

William Tatton gent., named in the commission, died 8 January, 14 James I [1616–17] at Withenshaw & Katherine, his wife, survives him & dwells at Whythenshaw; and Robert Tatton gent., is his son & heir, aged 12 years, 11 months, 12 days.

The Court of Wards Inquisition, Wards 7/60/234, gives the version of the first inquisition abstracted in full.]

# JOHN TAYLOR. (File 100. No. 16.)

Inquisition taken at Nantwich, 17 October, 5 Charles I [1629] before Hugh Maynwaringe esq., escheator in co. Chester, by virtue of the King's commission to enquire after the death of John Taylor, by the oath of Alexander Elcocke of Poole, Thomas Broocke of Leighton, Henry Malban of Munkscropenhall, John Cartwright of Shipnall, John Cartwright of Aston, John Cheswis of Mickley, Thomas Smyth of Checkley, Oliver Pollet of Fadeley, John Moulton of the same, Ralph Grafton of Worleston, Thomas Shenton of Stoke, Francis Botteley of Burlande,

William Waste of Hunsterston & Thomas Heath of Egerton, gentlemen.

They say the said John Taylor on I December, 4 Charles I [1628] was seised in fee of a mess. or burgage in Shipyorde, in or by Longesouthwork, co. Surrey, called the Sign of the Ship & of another mess, or burgage there called the Sign of the Connye, & all houses, shops, cellars, solars, &c. there in the tenures of Robert Chambers, William Radsye, William Monke, Joseph Wall & Daniel Monster & other premises there in the tenure of John Taylor aforesaid & so being seised, he then conveyed the same to Roger Wilbraham of Derfould, esq., Richard Minshull of Nantwich, gent. & Thomas Maynwaringe, son & heir apparent of Mathew Maynwaringe of Nantwich, gent., in consideration of a marriage before had between him & Elizabeth, daughter of said Mathew Maynwaringe, to the use of himself for life, with contingent remainders to his wife, Elizabeth, for life & his male issue by her, to wit to his son & heir apparent, John Taylor, in tail male, his other sons by her, in tail male, his daughters by her, in tail male, the right heirs of said John.

They say the said premises are held of the King as of his manor of East Greenwich, co. Kent, in socage, by fealty only & worth yearly (clear) £3 6s. 8d.

They say that the said John Taylor on 20 March, 4 Charles I [1628–9] at Nantwich by the "imbecility of his brain" [per imbecilitatem cerebri sui] & not otherwise became a lunatic & not from birth nor at any other time, & still remains so, so that he cannot sufficiently govern his lands, &c., & has no lucid intervals. John Taylor has no other lands &c. in co. Chester or co. Surrey or elsewhere.

### RICHARD TAYLOR.

(File 102. No. 14.)

Inquisition taken at Nantwich, 20 January, 10 Charles I [1634–5] before Thomas Aldersey esq., escheator in co.

Chester, by virtue of the King's writ to enquire after the death of Richard Taylor, by the oath of Thomas Brooke of Leighton, Hugh Whitnie of Coole Lane, Cholmondeley Salmon of the same, John Booth of Hankelowe, William Jackson of Aston, Randall Grafton of Worleston, William Cudworth of Newhall, Edward Hamnett of Aston, Richard Hamnett of Newhall, Robert Massie of Coole Lane, Ralph Cardiffe of Wolfall & George Salmon of Coole Lane, gentlemen.

They say the said Richard Taylor died seised in fee of a mess. & 20 a. of land in Aston, now in the tenure of Henry Beckett; of a cottage & garden in Aston now in the tenure of Richard Ravenscrofte; of a cottage & I a. of land in Aston, now in the tenure of Roger Wilkinson; of a cottage & I a. of land in Newhall, in the tenure of John Barnett; of a cottage & I a. of land in Newhall in the tenure of William Hardinge; of a water-grain-mill in Aston called Paradise Mill in the tenure of John Barnett; of a pasture called Coole Lane Field in Coole Lane, of about 6 a.; of 2 saltworks in Fulwiche alias Dirtwiche.

All which premises are held of the King as Earl of Chester, in chief, by knight service & are worth yearly (clear) 20s.

The said Richard Taylor died 7 May, 10 Charles I [1634] & George Taylor is his son & heir, aged at his father's death 40 years & more.

### ALICE TENCH (IDIOT). (File 94. No. 20.)

Inquisition taken at Chester Castle, II January, 17 James I [1619–20] before Edward Dod esq., Richard Brereton esq., Ralph Wilbraham esq., Hugh Maynwaring esq., escheator, Edward Gregge gent., John Werden gent. & Henry Delves, feodary, by virtue of the Prince's commission to enquire into the insanity of Alice Tench,

wife of Hugh Tench & formerly of Thomas Clutton gent., deceased, by the oath of William Davenport of Boughton, John Edwards of Cheavley, Thomas Buckley of Bickerton, Thomas Richardson of Boughton, Richard Bird of Broxton, Richard Coventree of Mollington, John Ashbrook of Tattenhall, James Doe of Sagghall, John Doe of the same, Francis Harden of Boughton, William Rosengreave of Hargreave, William Healey of Newton, Robert Barton of Saughall, Thomas Barlow of the same, Henry Phillipps of Christleton, Edward Urian of the same, James Hancock of Newton, John Crew of Elton, Randall Maddocks of Edge & John Cotton of Huntington, gentlemen.

They say that the said Alice Tench is, & from the time of her birth was, mad & an idiot & does not enjoy lucid intervals.

They say the said Alice & Thomas Clutton, formerly her husband, in his lifetime were seised of fee in the right of the said Alice, of 5 mess., 100 a. of land, 20 a. of meadow, 100 a. of pasture, 10 a. of wood in Overton, Hampton & Horton, in the several tenures of William Jennynges, Peter Dod, Thomas Aldersey & Thomas Shard. So being seised, Thomas Clutton died & Alice took to husband Hugh Tench & the said Hugh & Alice were seised of the same in the right of the said Alice.

The said Hugh & Alice, after their marriage, were seised, in the right of the said Alice, of the third part of a mess. in Chorleton & the lands thereunto belonging.

The said premises in Overton are held of William de Overton, in socage by fealty &  $\frac{1}{2}d$ . rent & are worth yearly (clear) 40s.

Those in Hampton held of the heirs of William de Malpas in socage, by fealty & 2s. rent & worth yearly (clear) 30s.

Those in Horton held of the heirs of Aman de Quite in socage, by fealty &  $\frac{1}{2}d$ . rent & I pair of white gloves & worth yearly (clear) 30s.

The third part of the premises in Chorleton [no tenure given] worth yearly 6s. 4d.

The said Alice has not alienated any of her lands, &c. Richard Clutton is son & heir apparent of the said Alice & is now aged 21 years & more & is mad & idiotic.

Lancaster, kt., by the oath of James Massie of Sale, Humfrey Page of Yardshaw, Edward Thornicroft of Thornicroft, Lea Henshall of Henshall, William Birtles of Hill, Philip Downes of Tofte, Thomas Gleave of Highleigh, Edward Harper of the same, Alexander Duncalf of Moberley, Edmund Howe of Ollerton, Ralph Barlow of Hale, Anthony Furnivall of Mylnehouse, Henry Hough of Chorley & Robert Webster of Nether Knuttesford, gentlemen.

They say that long before the death of the said Sir Edmund he was seised in fee of the moiety of the manors of Bollyn & Norcliffe & of the moiety of 50 mess., 20 cottages, 500 a. of land, 100 a. of meadow, 200 a. of pasture, 90 a. of wood, 200 a. of furze & heath & 50s. rent in Bollyn & Norcliffe & in Hough, Pownall, Chorley, Norley, Stangland, Deanerowe, Fulshaw & Wylme[s]low & of the advowson of the church of Wilmeslow.

So being seised, in the Court of Pleas on 29 September, 42 Elizabeth [1600] a fine was levied between Edward Cecyll esq. & Sir John Savage kt., plaintiffs, & Edmund Trafford then esq., now kt., deforciant, of the abovesaid moiety of manors & premises to the uses of an indenture made 27 September, 42 Elizabeth [1600] settling the same on the said Sir Edmund for life, with contingent remainders, after his death, to Sir Cecil Trafford kt., son of the said

Sir Edmund by Mildred, his wife, in tail male, &c., as appears in the said indenture.

They say the said premises, &c., are held of Charles, Prince of Wales, as Earl of Chester, by the third part of a knight's fee & are worth yearly (clear) £20.

They say the said Sir Edmund died at Trafford 7 May, 18 James I [1620] & Edmund Trafford esq. is his son & next heir & at his father's death was aged 36 years & more.

Sir Cecil Trafforde kt. survives & dwells at Trafford & has taken the profits, &c., of the premises since the death of the said deceased.

(File 99. No. 10.)

Golburne David & Cotton by Christleton & the moiety of the profits of the Leadsmithie with Rake in Northwich & all other mess., saltworks, lands, &c., in the said places & in Hanley, Milton, Christleton, Stanthorne, Oldwarton, Clyve, Stanford, Middlewych, Newton by Middlewych, Northwich, Brereton, Davenport, Somerford, Newbold. Astburie, Moreton, Hertford, Horton Castle, Northwyche, Wymincham, Pickmeyre, Twembrooks, Meere, Higheleighe, Bolington, Rowthestorne, Radnor, Bridesmeyre, Huns tlerston, Blacknall, Checkley, Utkington, Torperley, Alpram, Wettenhall, Marton, Arclide, Hope, Moresbarrowe, Whelock, Little Meoles, Leirton, & Lea by Wybunburie & free fisheries in the waters of Budworthe Meyre & Pickemer Meyre & the Dee, to them & their heirs for ever. [1587] for the payment of portions to his daughters & towards the ransom of himself if hereafter taken prisoner in the Queen's wars.

On 7 December, 1604, at Kynderton, the said Thomas Venables made his will, desiring that Lady Gargrave, all his brothers-in-law & sisters-in-law, his sister Manwaring & their children, who should come to his funeral, should have cloaks or gowns, giving bequests to his servants &

the poor, confirming the divers indentures made, & bequeathing money, &c. to his daughters, Lady Elizabeth Egerton & Mary Ashton, to his wife Anne, to his cousin, Hugh Manwaring & Mary & Eleanor Manwaring, sisters of said Hugh, to his cousin, Robert Venables, his son-in-law, Mr. Richard Ashton.

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## RULES.

I. That the Society shall be called the RECORD SOCIETY, and shall have for its object the transcribing and publishing of Original Documents relating to the Counties of Lancaster and Chester, or such other matter relating thereto as the Council shall deem to be of service to the members.

2. That the affairs of the Society shall be governed by a Council consisting of a President and twelve Members, the former of whom shall be *annually* elected by the Council.

3. That three Members of the Council shall form a

quorum.

4. That the subscription of Members of the Society shall be £1. 5s. per annum,\* which shall entitle them to the publications for the year; but any Member whose subscription shall be two years in arrear shall thereupon be removed from the Society, and shall not be re-admitted until all arrears have been paid. The number of Members is limited to 350.

5. That the subscriptions shall be due in advance on the 30th of June in each year, and that no work shall be issued

to any Member whose subscription is in arrear.

6. That an Annual Meeting of the Society shall be held in the month of October, of which due notice shall be sent to all the Members. At this meeting a Report of the work of the Society, with a Statement of the Income and Expenditure, shall be presented. These shall be annually published, together with a List of Members and the Rules of the Society.

7. That so long as the funds of the Society permit, two volumes at least shall be issued to the Members in each year.

8. That no copies of the publications of the Society shall be sold to non-members, except at an increased price to be

fixed by the Council.

9. The Editor of each Volume shall be entitled to ten copies of the work so edited by him, except in the case of an Editor who receives payment from the Society for editing any work, who shall only receive two copies of the work so edited by him.

10. That the Treasurer's Accounts shall be audited by two Members of the Society, who shall be elected at the

Annual Meeting.

<sup>\*</sup> The year commences 1 July in one year and ends 30 June in following year.

II. No alteration shall be made in any of the above Rules except at the Annual General Meeting. Notice of any proposed alterations must be sent to the Hon. Secretary a month before such General Meeting.

12. That a meeting of the Council of the Society shall be called by the Hon. Secretary at least once in every three

months.

The Annual Subscription of £1. 5s., entitling the Members to all the Volumes issued for that year, may be paid to the Hon. Treasurer, or to the credit of the Society with their Bankers, District Bank, Ltd., Sankey Street, Warrington, or at any of their branches.

# REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING 30 JUNE, 1937 (59th YEAR).

Read at the Annual Meeting, held at the Athenaeum, Liverpool, on 5 November, 1937.

SINCE the last Report two volumes have been issued to members, namely:—

No. 88. A Calendar of the Deeds and Papers in the possession of Sir James de Hoghton, Bart. Edited by J. H. Lumby, M.A.

No. 89. A Selection from the Prescot Court Roll and other Records. 1447-1600. Edited by F. A. Bailey, M.A.

As stated in the Report for the previous year, the Society is indebted to Mr. Robert Gladstone, B.C.L., M.A., for the whole cost of the production of these volumes. The very careful work of the editors must also be recognized.

The following volumes will be issued during the current year.

I. A second and final section of the Rolls of the Freemen of Lancaster with complete indexes.

This volume, like the earlier one, has been edited by Mr. T. Cann Hughes, M.A., F.S.A., and the index of place-names has been annotated by Miss A. G. Gilchrist, F.S.A., who has identified a large number of places about which there was doubt. The whole of the volume is in paged form and will be issued shortly. A second substantial donation by a member of the Council has been made towards the cost of this series.

2. The third and final section of the Cheshire Inquisitions Post Mortem, 1603-1660, edited by Mr. R. Stewart Brown, M.A., F.S.A.

The Council have accepted with gratitude an offer by Mr. Gladstone to present another volume to the Society. This will consist of abstracts of Lancashire deeds of the Norris family, sometime preserved at Aston Hall, and now in the British Museum. The volume will be edited by Mr. Lumby.

It was indicated in the last Report that the preparation of the material for a volume of entries on the Pipe Rolls relating to Cheshire was well advanced. The printing of this volume has been placed in the hands of Messrs. J. W. Ruddock and Sons of Lincoln, who are the printers for the Pipe Roll Society, and the work has been commenced. A considerable amount of collating remains to be done, and the issue of the volume cannot be decided upon at present. The record will yield historical matter relating to Cheshire that is almost entirely new, and a most generous donation towards the cost of printing has been promised by the Editor, Mr. Stewart-Brown.

In addition to the volumes just mentioned the Society have under consideration the following material for future issues.

- I. A further series of Cheshire and South Lancashire Marriage Bonds. Sufficient transcripts have already been made for an additional volume.
- 2. The final volume of the Lancashire Royalist Composition Papers.
  - 3. Index of Wills at Chester, 1821-30.
  - 4. Probate Act Books at Chester.

The Council will be pleased to consider suggestions of members respecting material for future volumes. The accessibility of such material and the cost of transcription have, of course, to be taken into account.

At the Meeting of the Council held on 23 October, 1936, the resignation of Mr. W. Asheton Tonge, as Honorary Treasurer, was accepted with much regret. A letter of appreciation of his services in this capacity for thirteen years was addressed to him. Mr. Tonge was, however too ill to receive the intimation and died, a few days later, on the 29th. He was one of the oldest members of the Society, and contributed generously to its funds on several occasions.
