## LANCASHIRE PAPISTS' ESTATES, 1717-1788. Volume I, 1717.

### INTRODUCTION.

As the main value of the Registers of Papists' Estates is genealogical and topographical it is not intended to discuss the penal laws of the later Stuarts. Under them the Roman Catholics had been excluded from the benefits of the Toleration Act, so that their religious services were illegal, and the Act of 1700 " for the further preventing the Growth of Popery" prevented Catholics from educating their children except in their own houses, and disallowed their inheriting or purchasing land. There was, however, little real persecution, although they were obliged to pay a double Land Tax; and, after the discovery of Atterbury's plot they were, in 1722, taxed to an amount of  $f_{100,000}$  in addition to the other taxes.

In order that the estates of Catholics could be taxed to the full whenever occasion required, an Act was passed in 1715<sup>1</sup> "to oblige Papists to register their Names and real Estates" and as this Act is the authority for the registers which follow, it is here quoted extensively:—

"Whereas the Papists within this Kingdom, notwithstanding the tender Regard that hath been shewn them for many years last past, by omitting to put in Execution the many penal Laws which (on occasion of the many just Provocations they have given, and horrid Designs they have framed, for the Destruction of this Kingdom and the Extirpation of the Protestant Religion) have been made against them; and notwithstanding they have enjoyed, and do still enjoy the Protection and Benefit of the Government, as well as the rest of his Majesty's Subjects, have not only, all or

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the greatest Part of them, been concerned in stirring up and supporting the late unnatural Rebellion, for the dethroning and murdering his most sacred Majesty; for destroying our present happy Establishment; for settling a Popish Pretender upon the Throne of this Kingdom; for the Destruction of the Protestant Religion and the cruel murdering and massacring its Professors; by which they brought a vast Expence upon this Nation; and whereas it manifestly appears by their Behaviour, that they take themselves to be obliged, by the Principles they profess, to be Enemies to his Majesty and to the present happy Establishment, and watch for all Opportunities of fomenting and stirring up new Rebellions and Disturbances within the Kingdom, and of inviting Foreigners to invade it: And for as much as it is highly reasonable that they should contribute a large Share to all such extraordinary Expences as are or shall be brought upon this Kingdom by their Treachery and Instigation: And to the end that, by paying largely to the late great Expences by them brought upon this Nation, they may be deterred, if possible, from the like expences for the future; And that this nation may have the benefit of his Majesty's gracious Condescension, in giving his Interest in the two third Parts of all the Papists Estates, which are already forfeited to him by Law, for the use of the Publick, either by seizing the said two third Parts of their Estates for the publick Service, or by laving some Tax or Charge upon their Estates in lieu thereof, in such Proportion and in such Manner as shall be determined to be reasonable in Parliament; And to the end that their Estates may be certainly known and discovered, . . . Be it enacted . . . .

That all and every Person . . . not having taken the Oaths herein after-mentioned before the last Day of Trinity term, 1716, . . . . having any Estate or Interest in any Lands, Tenements or Hereditaments, or who shall hereafter have any Estate or Interest in any Lands, Tenements or Hereditaments lying, being or arising in that Part of Great Britain called England . . . . who is or shall be a Popish Recusant or Papist . . . . shall, if he, she or they be, on 24 June 1716, of the Age of one and twenty years, . . . . take the several Oaths appointed to be taken by such Persons who bear any office under his Majesty, by an Act made in this present Session of Parliament . . . . and also repeat and subscribe the Declaration set down and expressed in an Act of Parliament made in the thirtieth year of the Reign of the late King Charles the Second . . . , at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace to be holden for the County . . . . where such Lands, Tenements and Hereditaments . . . . shall be . . . . or in default thereof

shall . . . . register . . . . his, her or their Name or Names, and all such Lands, Tenements and Hereditaments, whereof he, she or they . . . . shall be in Possession, or in the Receipt or Perception of the Rents or Profits . . . , and shall express . . . , in such Register, in what Parish, Township or Place such Lands ..., lie, ..., and who, for the Time being, is or are the Possessors therof, . . . and what Estate or Interest he, she or they . . . . have in the same, . . . . and the yearly Rent reserved to him, her or them . . . , if the same shall be lett; and if the same shall be lett upon Lease, then by whom such Lease was made, what vearly or other Rent is reserved thereupon, and what Fine or Sum of Money was paid for such Lease . . . , in a Parchment-Book or Books, Roll or Rolls, which shall be kept by the Clerk of the Peace for every County . . . . where such Lands . . . . shall respectively lie . . . . And to the end that all fraudulent or covenous registring any Persons Names or Estates, who do not desire to have them registered, may be prevented, every Person whose Name and Estate shall be, or ought to be registred as aforesaid, is hereby obliged to take care that his Name be, within the said six Months hereby allowed for making such Registry, subscribed to such Registry or Entry in the said Books or Rolls, in the Presence of two or more Justices of the Peace for the County . . . . in open Sessions, either by the Person himself whose Name and Estate shall be so registered, or by his Attorney or Attornies thereunto lawfully authorized by Warrant of Attorney . . . .; and two of the Justices of the Peace then present shall subscribe their Names to every such Entry which shall be so made before them . . . And to the end that the Parties concerned in the Premisses may find no Difficulty in procuring their Names and Estates to be registred as aforesaid. all and every such Clerks of the Peace are hereby required to keep Parchment-Books or Parchment-Rolls at some notorious Place in the County . . . in which they shall act . . . and shall . . . . register and enter in the said Books or Rolls the Christian and Surnames of all and every such Person or Persons who . . . desire to be registred as aforesaid . . . .: Provided the Person or Persons who desire such Registry to be made shall tender and pay to such Clerks of the Peace . . . . the Fees hereby appointed . . . . and such Clerks of the Peace . . . . shall carry the said Books and Rolls . . . , with them to the next and every other Quarter Sessions of the Peace to be held for the County . . . until the time of such subscribing the same shall be expired . . . .; and such Clerks of the Peace shall also keep alphabetical tables

of the Surnames of all and every such Person and Persons whose Names and Estates shall be so registred, and of the Parishes and Townships where the Lands so registred lie, with reference to the Place in the Book or Books, Roll or Rolls, where such Names and Lands shall be registred; and shall also carefully keep all such Warrants of Attorney as shall be so proved, as aforesaid, upon a File, together with such Books and Rolls. . . . and shall have for such Registry and Entry on Record, a Fee of three Pence for every 200 Words . . . and shall also have the Sum of four Pence for every Search that shall be made for the Name or Estate of any Person; . . .

. . . and if any such Person or Persons . . . . shall not either take and subscribe such Oath, and repeat and subscribe such Declaration, as aforesaid, in such Manner, as aforesaid, or register his, her or their respective Name and Names, and Estates, in such manner, as aforesaid . . . . within the respective Times herein before limited . . . or shall not register the same truly; that then . . . [they] . . . shall forfeit the Fee-simple and Inheritance of all such Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments . . . two third Parts thereof to the King, and the other third Part thereof to such Person or Persons, being a Protestant or Protestants, who shall sue for the same at Common Law . . . ."

There were, in Lancashire, about eleven hundred estates registered, ranging from the tiny properties of husbandmen to the great estates of such families as Molyneux, Gerard, and Clifton. The distribution of the Catholic families is interesting, it appearing that they were widespread in West Derby and Leyland Hundreds, numerous in Amounderness, few in Blackburn, very few in Salford and South Lonsdale, and absent from North Lonsdale. The presence of a great Catholic estate, such as those mentioned above, seemed to ensure a number of smaller Catholic families clustering on and around it.

Naturally the great majority of the estates were registered immediately in 1717, but for a variety of reasons some were registered between 1718 and 1788, the Act being repealed in 1791.

The authority for these Registers has been *The English* Catholic Nonjurors of 1715, by Estcourt and Payne,

published in 1885. The volume, dealing with the whole county, was based upon the returns by the Clerks of the Peace to the Commissioners of Forfeited Estates, and gives only the minimum of information about each estate. There are, among the registers now printed, some twentynine which do not appear in Estcourt and Payne. These are distinguished by an asterisk, while there are in Estcourt and Payne those for John Gregson of Balderstone, yeoman, Nicholas Sanderson of Great Marton, John Stock of Lathom and Richard Woolfall of Woolfall, esq.—which are missing from the registers preserved at Preston. Unfortunately, owing to the exigencies of war it has not been possible to consult the returns in the Public Record Office.

Four types of document arising out of the Act of 1715 have been preserved, and are now in the County Record Office at Preston; (i) the original particulars as handed in to the Clerk of the Peace; (ii) the official Register Rolls prepared from the particulars and signed in open court by the individual Catholic or his attorney and by two witnessing justices; (iii) the warrants of attorney handed in when the individual himself was absent, and (iv) the index book of individuals, showing the townships where their estates lay.

In a few cases the Register Rolls are damaged, and some few of the original particulars are missing, but by using both series it has been possible to obtain the information which is here printed. This volume contains the estates included in Register Rolls I, II, and part of III, and it is hoped to present the remaining rolls in the future.

For the sake of conserving space certain conventions have been adopted:—all leases are for three lives, the number of those in being only being given, and the lessor is the person registering the estate; any exceptions are stated.

The first entry, that of John Mercer of Warton, had been printed *in extenso*, but every succeeding entry had been abbreviated. All names, both of persons and places, are shown as in the original.

Acknowledgment is due to Sir George Etherton, Kt., O.B.E., D.L., Clerk of the Peace for the County of Lancaster, for his permission to print these rolls.

## Lancashire Papists' Estates.

## FIRST ROLL.

"THE Inrollments and Records of the Registers of such papists who have registered with the Clerk of the Peace of and for the County of Lanc[aste]r att the severall quarter Sessions of the peace for the said County pursuant to the two acts of Parliam[en]t, vizt., one made Anno primo Georgii R. entituled an act to oblige Papists to register their names and reall estates, the other made Anno tertio Georgii R. entituled an act to oblige papists to register their names and reall estates and for enlargeing the time for such registring and for secureing purchases made by protestants.

To the clerk of the peace of and for the County of Lanc[aste]r or his lawfull Deputy.

I, JOHN MERCER OF WARTON<sup>1</sup> IN THE COUNTY OF LANC[ASTE]R, yeo[man], in pursuance and obedience to a late act of Parliam[en]t entituled an Act to oblige Papists to register their names and reall estates, do by this writeing under my hand desire you or any of you to register my name and estate in the severall lands, tenements, and hereditaments herein after contained in the manner and in the words following, to witt:

A true particular of the messuages, lands, tenements and hereditaments in the parishes, town-[shi]pps and places in the s[ai]d County of Lanc[aste]r Whereof I the s[ai]d John Mercer or any other person or persons in trust for me or for my benefit or advantage is or are seized or possessed or in the receipt or percepcion of the rents or profitts thereof.

Imprimis: three closes or parcels of land containing

six acres or thereabouts in Kellamere<sup>2</sup> in the s[ai]d County in my own possession in which I have an estate in fee simple. Item one parcell of land in Kellamere aforesaid containing six acres or thereabouts in my own possession in which I have an estate or term of thirteen yeares at and under the yearly rent of six shillings.
